This year began with some big changes in the Centre, with David Farrugia moving home to take up a new role at Deakin's Research for Educational Impact centre. For Steve, Julia and Julia in particular, Dave has been such a great colleague and confidant who we are going to miss working so closely with. We hope to keep working with David and continuing the connection with Deakin as much as we can in the future.

Also, Kate Davies has left academia to take a position at Homelessness NSW. Kate has been central to our efforts to create more community partnerships and help our research work reach those in the field. Like Dave, we hope to continue our collaborations with Kate to continue this work.

Steve has taken over the Director role, with Julia Coffey continuing as Deputy Director. Julia Cook has taken the role to lead Partnerships and Engagement with the centre, and has been creating great new connections with a range of philanthropic, government and community organisations we are engaging with in current and future grant applications.

In research news, we are in the midst of completing a new project on 'Betting with mates: Gambling apps and young men's social practices' continuing our work on youth and everyday financial practices. Some initial findings from this project will be presented at one of our 2 very exciting <u>Social</u> Science Week events.

The first one is a seminar called <u>Fintech Futures</u>, featuring two of our International Network members, Beverley Skeggs (Lancaster, UK) and Roger Burrows (Bristol, UK), and Centre members Julia Cook, Julia Coffey, Jonathan Curtis and Steven Threadgold. The line up is:

The second event is a Public Lecture by Roger Burrows called <u>The Superrich, Digital Technologies and the Politics of Exit</u>. Details are in the link, it will be in person at NuSpace and on Zoom, Wednesday September 6, 5pm-7pm.

Julia Cook been talking to the media about buy now pay later regulation on <u>Triple J Hack</u>, ABC RN's <u>The Money</u> and a <u>related article</u>, and in an op-ed with Josh Healy for the <u>Newcastle Herald</u>. The centre also wrote a submission to Treasury's discussion of regulating buy now pay later in Australia, which can be found <u>here</u>. Julia Cook also wrote an article for ABC Online as part of her 2022 ABC Top 5 media residency, which can be found <u>here</u>.

Julia Coffey's research was featured in article for the ABC analysing body image, diet culture and body modification trends. This was featured on the main ABC news website and promoted on ABC Radio National social media. Her research was also featured in an article in the Sydney Morning

Herald, April 23, 2023, analysing the <u>role of social media in how young people view themselves</u>, rising body image concerns, and the inadequacy of 'body positivity lite' messages.

I have been promoting the edited collection with Jessica Gerrard, <u>Class in Australia</u>, with a <u>news story</u> <u>for the ABC</u> and talking to <u>Geraldine Doouge on Radio National</u>.

Working with Andi Pekarek (Uni of Melbourne), Josh Healy has continued his work on developments in the gig economy, looking especially at the impact of the pandemic for gig workers' conditions and the regulatory possibilities. This work has included a growing focus on how young people participate on both sides of digital labour platforms, not only as workers but also as consumers. Earlier this year, the pair published a book chapter on consumers and gig work in the *Routledge Handbook of the Gig Economy*, edited by Immanuel Ness from City University New York (CUNY). Then, in May, they made a submission to the <u>Australian Government's public consultation</u> on 'Employee-like forms of work' to summarise some of their recent academic contributions and thinking. Lastly, in June, they presented work in progress in a seminar at Flinders University in Adelaide, titled 'The gig economy through the eyes of young Australians'. This is a continuation of earlier work begun and presented initially at the Newcastle Youth Studies Centre launch event in December 2022.

The <u>Journal of Applied Youth Studies</u>, co-edited by Julia Cook, has recently been indexed by Scopus and ranked by Scimago for the first time - it is now Q1-ranked and welcomes submissions from authors working across the research-policy-practice-theory spectrum.
